**Driving Question:** How has fear been used as a political, defensive, and cultural tool to shape our society?

Big Idea: Conflict has been a powerful force in shaping our world.

### Part Five: Synthesis and Presentation Ideas

I want to create a physical object to share my research and answer to my inquiry question.

This object will highlight the story and path, in which the stance on religion changes with fear. I want it to be an analogy of sorts because I feel that is a good way to connect thinking and show a deeper understanding of what I've learnt.

Some analogies that I've thought about so far:

- A Garden of Weeds: strong weeds grow alongside flowers, each representing a different faith. Even though people try to promote religious harmony, fear feeds the weeds, showing how some may turn to extreme beliefs when they feel their religion isn't enough during crises.
- A Broken Compass: representing religious guidance, but fractured and unreliable. This analogy illustrates how fear distorts individuals' moral compasses, leading them to seek comfort and direction in different religious traditions or abandoning faith altogether in the face of hardship.
- A House of Mirrors: reflects distorted images of religious figures and icons. When individuals conform their fear and trauma their perceptions of their religious figures become distorted, leading to skepticism of their faith.

These analogies are not solidified, and are more meant to be different ways to approach the certain aspects of my thoughts on people's relationship to religion in the face of fear. After doing more research I hope to have more knowledge where I can add connections and depth to elevate these ideas. Throughout this creation I am aiming to showcase a sophisticated understanding of how fear has been used as a cultural tool in shaping our society.
