
Samuel Abrams

- Born in Liverpool in 1830, Samuels childhood was not easy. His family faced racism and where poor his whole life.

- After arriving in California a few months later, Samuel and his brother joined a local mining company and worked hard for a couple years.

- After working for so long gold-less, they where eager to get a jump on the gold found in the Cariboo in BC.
- Following the "gold trail" north lead them to Victoria, which was a less busy alternative to the larger mining towns in the interior.
- They pitched their money and bought a plot of land to make a business to supply the miners with baked goods and breads
- Their bakers did very well and soon they opened another location and became well known in the town. They started families and lived in Victoria the rest of their lives
